Reports

Fire-Cpt. Shaun Mulmedy reminded us that this is the time we see an uptick in injuries in the kitchen including grease fires. Be mindful as you prepare holiday meals. Don't overload outlets. Change your furnace filters. Check CO2 monitors. In October about 4 calls/day this is average. Fire Department is hiring. Slcfire.com Dave thanked the fire department and emergency services for the quick response to the construction accident on 4th Ave. There was a foundation collapse and a worker was trapped.

School Board-Katherine Kennedy reported that the SL School Board has been busy. Last night they discussed the new adult education school @ the new prison. It will be named later. There will be 6 teachers and 2 paraprofessionals. The census results are back and school borders are changing. Changes are on the School Board website. Option 1 has been adopted. Police-Detective Norgaard could not attend tonight but gave his report to Dave. On October 20 an Avenues resident was walking through the cemetery and a person in the cemetery pulled a gun on the resident. Be aware of your surroundings. There was only 1 residential burglary in October. The police are still working on response times. Still trying to hire. This is the time when we typically see a spike in vehicle thefts. Cars left running to warm up while the owner finishes getting ready for work. May come outside to find the vehicle is gone. Please keep you cars locked and in running order. Now is the time to check tire tread and pressure before the weather gets cold and snowy.

City Council-Councilmember Wharton was introduced and announced that the Cemetery Arboretum is dedicated to the memory of former Sexton, Mark Smith. They conducted tours with State Legislators to educate on the importance of cemetery not just to SLC but to the entire state. There are 3 or 4 meetings left in the year. The council will fill the Dist 1 vacancy. The council can appoint the person who was elected if they are known. There has been concern about the city xeriscaping ordinance. This ordinance hasn't changed in 20 years. The hope is to get on the agenda for spring. Please let Chris know your thoughts. The Legislative session is coming up. One issue is the redistricting for City Council Districts. Regarding the Pantages theater the Design Review has been approved by Planning Commission. An appeal to deny this approval was denied.

Nominating Committee and Election-Dave Presented the list of Officers and Board Members for the 2022 Calendar Year. Craig Provost moved and Carlton Detar seconded a motion to place the slate before the GACC

Membership for approval. There was a unanimous vote by voice and raise of hands to approve the slate. Dave then announced that there was an error in the slate. David Berg should have been added to the Lindsay Gardens Board list. Craig Provost moved and jill VanLangeveld seconded the motion to approve the Board list with David Berg added. This motion passed as well. December 8 will be the first Board Meeting with the new Board. Congratulation to all.

4th Avenue Well Update-SLC Public Utilities several representatives in attendance. Jesse Stewart presented a PowerPoint recapping the project, outlining the history of need for upgrades, the efforts to get where we are now. Project completion plan-workers safety has improved immensely. I year warranty on the parts. Noise assessment has been completed the well is below limit at all times. No Generator on site. Will bring in as needed. Thanks to the Local Community/stakeholders, GACC, Mayor and Council specifically Council Member Wharton, City Departments, Historic Landmarks, Staff form their office, and consultants. Lessons learned for 5th and U include the need to look at surroundings, sharing information with planning department, and listening to concerns early in design the process with an eye toward sensitivity to community needs.. SLC Public Utilities is the oldest retail water provider west of the Mississippi.

Zoning Change Request for Stealth Cell Towers-Aaron Barlow from SLC Planning and Pete Simmons from Verizon presented. Aaron Barlow from SLC Planning lead into the presentation Verizon submitted application to allow stealth towers in most districts in the city. This application is withdrawn. New request is for PL-Public Lands districts in the city. Map showing these. Fire Stations, Schools, Libraries, Police Stations, Pocket Parks near public buildings. Request would allow 75 feet. From now Community Council or individual citizens can provide comments directly to Aaron at aaron.barlow@slcgov.com

This will come before the Planning Commission at the meeting in December (8th). The City Council has ultimate deciding authority.

Pete Simmons-current code allows placement of towers in all zones if they meet the zoning height requirements. To get signal above the city we need to go up. 60 feet and up to get signal. Originally proposed 80 ft at pioneer precinct. Code doesn't provide for that height for stealth facility. Need for more speed and signal. Get creative bringing antennas into residential areas. Churches, schools and parks. Current code is 60 feet. Need conditional use for 75 feet. Clarification from Aaron-stealth towers up to 60 feet are already allowed all over the city. The small towers in right-of-way are not these and are permitted by the State.

Questions and Comments: Our city is saturated by 5g towers. Why do we also need 60 ft tall towers? Small has limited range cannot penetrate buildings. 500-1000 ft usual for small. Small towers hold 3 antennae, large towers hold 12 antennae. Want to provide other services. Need both to cover whole area in dense areas. Comment-conditional use is never denied. Would the towers be used by more than Verizon? Macro facilities yes, smaller do not. These cannot go into back yards. Want to put them in industrial areas or in residential, churches, schools and parks. Do large towers mean fewer smaller towers? All depends. Can't say fewer. Just based on network needs. Probably no reductions. Is there a way instead of conditional use permit because if the condition is met, then the permit is issued. Is there a community way to make this better. Should we as a community oppose this and then try to work for a different solution? Aaron answered that he cannot tell us what to do. Are there health implications from these towers? Pete said No. Will there be advertising or symbols on this? Aaron answered Would have to follow sign codes. Buildings downtown lease space to towers. Would the city be paid for these? Yes, there is a lease agreement between the city and the carrier. Does the city receive rent for those in the right of ways. No one knows. Engineering Division would have the answer. Comment on bad experience with abandoned tower on facility. City must insist that they be removed when they are no longer useful. In current code there is protection for this. Currently can put the towers in at height allowed by the zoning. Looking to make it higher. Public lands are different than open space? Yes different zoning

Dave asked that we send comments and concerns to Aaron.

Pete said that Applicant will put in what they want. Community ideas can be sent to Pete Simmons for incorporation. Show up to the hearings. Pete wants to work with communities.

It was pointed out that once the text is amended, it is opened up to anyone who wants to come in and use it. When you look at the Avenues, we do have tall buildings that would meet the needs without need to build towers. Isn't that a better alternative? Pete says maybe—always trying to look at vertical assets. Sometimes building owners are not willing to work with them.

Question about density. No limit to the # of towers per lot.

Dave thanked both Pete and Aaron for presenting. As a community we won't have time to have a vote and then send response so individuals need to do this.

Open Forum-Michael posted in chat but Nov 18 National Registry Meeting. Will appeal to planning commission again. Still in the window for this. Will meet with Mayor Mendenhall.

Meeting Adjourned-Dave thanked everyone. Meeting ended at 8:55pm
