

Air Quality: Do spikes of PM_{2.5} pollution have an effect on our brains?

On November 23, 2020 the University of Utah released the findings of a study trying to answer the question: "Do pollution spikes of $PM_{2.5}$ have an effect on our brains?" Over the years many studies have shown that chronic high levels of $PM_{2.5}$ cause problems with the respiratory system. Newer studies are also linking a variety of neurological problems in children and adults to the very dirty air. However, no one had studied the effects of $PM_{2.5}$ pollution spikes like we have in Salt Lake County especially during our winter inversions. You can read their complete study using the link at the end of this article.

• What they did: The State of Utah has been testing 3rd and 8th graders for several years with a standardized test called SAGE test (Student Assessment of Growth and Excellence). The researchers looked at the math and English scores of the third graders in 156 primary public schools in Salt Lake County for 2017. They focused on the percentage of students whose scores were lower than gradelevel expectations. In order to ensure that air pollution was the only variable affecting test scores, the researchers created a school disadvantage variable and they also accounted for the school's location.

Then, they evaluated each school's chronic and peak air pollution concentrations which they received from the EPA's Downscaler data. On average, schools had chronic PM_{2.5} levels of just over 8 micrograms per cubic meter. To establish peak air pollution episodes, the researchers identified the number of days each school was exposed to PM_{2.5} levels in the 95th percentile. The peaks for the year averaged 23 micrograms per cubic meter. For context the EPA's unhealthy air standard is 35 micrograms per cubic meter.

• What they Discovered: Chronic pollution exposure was associated with lower test scores, however the effect disappeared when researchers controlled for the social disadvantage factors. In contrast, the frequency of peak pollution exposure was associated with a higher percentage of students who tested below grade level in math and English, even after controlling for social disadvantage.

• Their Suggestions:

- 1. Our legislators could advance public health initiatives that protect children's exposure to air pollution.
- 2. The state could improve regulations that would prevent schools from being built in high pollution areas.
- 3. Schools could invest in better air filtration systems in classrooms to help mitigate the poor air quality which already exists. (The schools districts are working on this).
- 4. State and federal legislators could advocate for *lower* federal air pollution standards in the face of growing evidence that even low PM₂₅ concentrations do damage to the human body.

Casey Mullen, one of the authors of the study -- "Here in Utah, with our constant air quality issues throughout the seasons, we need to increase awareness about air pollution exposures. This is a conversation everyone should be having—people need to be informed about what's at stake".

My personal suggestion: Don't make any important decisions during peak PM_{2.5} concentration days. You can find the full study at https://www.mdpi.com/1660-4601/17/18/6931/htm.

Trails Trails

Have you been in Popperton Park, City Creek Canyon, or the foothills recently and noticed anything new?? These are exciting times as the Foothill Trails Master Plan starts to be implemented.

Several new trails have been or are in the process of being constructed in Popperton Park, the City Creek area, and Morris Mountain area. There are new walking trails, and new biking trails. At Popperton Park, there is a lovely, undulating hiking loop behind the Popperton Garden plots - a great trail if you need some quick exercise and reflection. This trail is OPEN, so try it out, walkers! The well-used trail south of Popperton Park Way will be limited to walkers and a beginner bike loop has just been completed as well as two downhill-directional biking trails to the east of Spring Gulch. And after extensive consideration, due to the sensitive nature of the wildlife and botanical habitat within Spring Gulch, the City's Trails Division has decided not to build the planned walking loop in that space. You may have also noticed a couple of new trails traversing City Creek Canyon. The Lower City Creek Loop is a designated walking trail and is already open and ready for use. Access to this trail is available from the 8th Avenue Switchbacks, from Bonneville Boulevard, and 500 North. Finally, there are new trails under construction up at Morris Mountain. One wonderful ridge trail will provide walkers access to fantastic vistas overlooking the northern extent of City Creek Canyon. This trail is open and ready for use. The downhill biking trail that is under construction on Morris Mountain snakes along the east side of the mountain and intersects with other trails at multiple locations. While these trails will provide fantastic opportunities for future recreation, it is important that these brand new trails be given the opportunity to rest, settle, and harden before they are opened. If the bike trails are used while they are still closed, they risk causing significant erosion. PLEASE stay off the newly constructed closed trails, as the signs state only YOU can prevent trail erosion!

Salt Lake City Cemetery Closure Update!

The Sexton of the Salt Lake City Cemetery, Keith Van Otten, provided a recent update on the continued closure of the cemetery due to the September storm. The full text is available at https://www.slc.gov/parks/city-cemetery/.

Keith highlighted that due to the historic nature of the cemetery, the extent of the damage especially to headstones and monuments, and the need to work with the State Historic Preservation Office, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and an archeologist, it is a slow process putting the Cemetery back together! Further, safety hazards remain at the cemetery including the presence of tree root balls and stumps, and the need to fill multiple large holes that resulted from the downed trees. While we miss the cemetery, in this interim period we are forging ahead with the creation of a future Friends of the Salt Lake City Cemetery group. A number of residents have already asked how they can be involved in the future preservation and restoration of this wonderful historical and cultural treasure. Thank you to each of you who have already been in contact. If you are interested in learning

The Greater Avenues Community Council has registered as a team for the Clear the Air Challenge. The challenge begins February




