#### **IThe ncredible Gambel Oak**

Gambel Oak woodlands protect our watershed by stabilizing the soil and supporting a plethora of life not



readily apparent to most passersby. It begins beneath our feet; a world of soil, roots, microbes, invertebrates, and fungi that we can never fully experience. I know almost nothing about subterranean ecosystems but they are intriguing support systems for the landscapes we see around us. Just above the soil, the decaying leaf litter shelters a wide variety of creatures including spiders, slugs, woodlice

(pillbugs), ticks, and millipedes. Ecological surveys of Gambel Oak woodlands beginning in the 1940s demonstrated that many more invertebrates live in oak leaf litter than in surrounding grassland habitats. They are excellent foraging areas for insectivorous birds and other creatures that like dining on arthropods, seeds, and/or acorns.

As we move off the ground and up the oak trees, we find lichens, beetle larvae, and other small creatures hidden within the gnarled bark. The branch network is dense and provides protection for singing birds or rock squirrel sentinels looking out for danger. It is easy for a junco to hide amongst the branches but not so easy for a Cooper's hawk to dive in after them. Some birds nest on the ground or tucked into the thicket.

Smaller branches, twigs, acorns, and shoots provide good forage for various mammals, although Gambel Oak contains tannic acid which is toxic in large quantities. Oak stems are also home to a fungus that causes stem galls - puffy, blister-like growths. Leaves are eaten by various insects like leafrollers and cankerworms, which in turn are delectable to birds. Many different gall wasps lay their eggs in leaves, causing small bumps or round balls to form. These are leaf galls and are generally harmless to the plant while providing shelter for the tiny larvae. Other parasitoid wasps lay their own eggs on the gall wasp larvae, if they can find them, for their own larvae to devour. Most gall wasp species are partly parthenogenic, meaning that some generations are entirely female and reproduce asexually.

This article is only a short preview of the incredible life found in Gambel Oak woodlands. I hope it makes you curious about the organisms we can step outside to observe and discover.

#### **Housing Crisis** by Salt Lake City Planner Reudigar Matthes

The current housing crisis demands a bold response.



Salt Lake City is creating a new housing plan, called Housing SLC that envisions a more affordable city for everyone and prioritizes individuals and households who face the greatest risk of housing Reudcurity, displacement, and homelessness. Based on months of engagement with and feedback from the community, the City has drafted a plan that responds to the needs in the community, which

are centered around three goals:

1. Make progress toward closing the housing gap of 5,500 units of deeply affordable housing and increase the supply of housing at all levels of affordability while reducing overall water use and improving air quality.

2. Increase housing stability throughout the city.

3. Increase opportunities for homeownership and other

wealth and equity building opportunities.

Housing SLC is currently available for public comment.

The public comment period closes on April 16.

#### **Emergency Preparedness Fair - Saturday, April 22**

There will be information about building 96-hour kits, presentations by the SL Regional Hospital, LDS Hospital, the American Red Cross, Ham Radio, Salt Lake Office of Emergency Management, the SL Fire Department and more. There will be a raffle and prizes. Come to have fun and to learn how to prepare for emergencies and keep your family safe.



#### **FireWise** by Shane Carlson

Over the last several years, below average precipitation and devastating winter wildfires such as the Marshall fire in Colorado made clear that wildfires were a year-round concern. This year, above average precipitation has provided some relief so long as the precipitation continues and the likely increase in vegetation doesn't turn into even more dried out fuel this upcoming Fall. That said, I strongly encourage everyone to view wildfire preparation as a year-round activity with Spring, Summer and Fall focused on wildfire resistant landscaping, hardening structures against the threat of wildfires and the removal of potential fuels. Winters and early Spring are a great time to organize your Go Bags and to make plans (specifically, two evacuation routes, relandscaping and structure hardening both main and secondary buildings, as well as other structures such as fencing). Make sure those Go Bags and plans include your pets!

National Wildfire/Firewise Community Preparedness Day is May 6th (https://www.nfpa.org/Events/Events/National-Wildfire-Community-Preparedness-Day - always the first Saturday in May). Several Salt Lake City service divisions (including Sustainability and Public Utilities, along with Fire) have joined with the Utah Department of Natural Resources – Division of Forestry, Fire and State Lands (DNR-FFSL) to assist with fuels removal for residents living within the GACC Firewise candidate community boundaries. Visit the SLC GACC Firewise web-page (https://www.slc.gov/fire/communitywildfire-preparedness-day/) for details about Firewise community boundaries, fuels pile guidelines, and how to report the time and resources used in the removal of fuels from your property (this last step is REQUIRED to be eligible for fuels pick-

up – we need your address to know where to send the pick-up crews!).

The SLC GACC Wildfire web-page (linked to above) is a great resource for actions you can take to make your home and property more resistant to wildfire. The GACC Wildfire Preparedness web-page (https://slc-avenues.org/firewise) also has a number of links to resources.

Many of you have asked for landscaping guidance. The Utah State University Extension Office (a great resource for all things gardening) has information on both Firewise landscaping (https://extension.usu.edu/preparedness/files/Firewise-Landscaping-for-Utah.pdf) and Firewise plants (https://extension.usu.edu/preparedness/files/Firewise-Plants-for-Utah-

Landscapes.pdf) that are suitable for the Salt Lake City foothills.

For those living on the Wildlands Urban Interface (WUI), now is the time to submit your applications to remove fuels on adjacent City lands (https://www.slc.gov/parks/trails-natural-lands/citizen-wildfire-mitigation-permit-program/) Lastly, if you aren't able to remove fuels in time for the annual Firewise fuels pick-up day or IF YOU LIVE OUTSIDE THE FIREWISE COMMUNITY BOUNDARIES, SLC's "Call 2 Haul" program (https://www.slc.gov/sustainability/waste-management/c2h/) is a fantastic resource for year round fuels (see "Green Waste") pick-up. Additionally, if your removed fuels (see "Green Waste") pick-up. are not too bulky (leaves and chip small to medium size branches), the year round extra compost cans available from "Call 2 Haul" (https://www.slc.gov/sustainability/waste-management/special-curbside-services/) can also assist with the removal of a large amount of material (two extra green waste containers for up to four weeks collected on your regular collection day).

### **Volunteer Tree Planting at** the Salt Lake City Cemetery

SLC Urban Forestry, Tree Utah, the GACC Urban Forestry Committee, and the Friends of the Salt Lake City Cemetery will be hosting a tree-planting event on Friday, 5 May. There will be 3 separate work sessions – tentatively planned to start at 9 AM, 1 PM, and an 'after work' session at 5 PM. Volunteers will need to wear closed toe shoes and bring gloves and sunscreen. Sign-up details will be available in next month's newsletter and will also be on the Friends of the Cemetery website - https://slc-avenues.org/friends-slccemetery.

We have 50 trees to be planted. These trees will contribute to the Mark Smith Arboretum and help to replace some of the 270+ trees that were uprooted in the 2020 windstorm.

Another volunteer activity to be hosted by the Friends of the Salt Lake City Cemetery will be the post-Memorial Day Clean-up at the Cemetery, tentatively scheduled for the evenings of June 7th and 8th, and the morning of June 10th. Last year we had almost 200 volunteers help clean up, recycle plastic and compost green materials. Seven tons of green waste and two tons of plastic was diverted from the landfill through these efforts!

Both of these volunteer activities are great opportunities for you to support our cemetery, enjoy the green space, meet your neighbors, and contribute to your community. We hope you can join us.
