February 2024 Chair's Message by 2024 GACC Chair Joseph "Jurphy" Murphy Have Your Voice Heard in Our Utah Legislature!



Thank you to all who attended the January Community Council meeting and provided feedback about issues that matter to you in the Avenues! The open house meeting was a huge success, and we received many valuable comments via email, Zoom, and in person.

Our board is reading each and every comment to see if and how the GACC can enhance the

community or connect you to the appropriate agencies that can help.

Our February 7th Community Council Meeting will be in the middle of the 2024 Utah Legislative Session, which runs from January 16 through March 1. During the meeting you'll have the opportunity to hear from your Utah legislative delegation about their priorities and progress:

• House District 22 Representative Jen Dailey-Provost, jdprovost@le.utah.gov, covering all of the Greater Avenues;

• Senate District 8 Senator Todd Weiler, tweiler@le.utah.gov, covering the northern portion of the Aves above 4th Ave on the west half and above 7th Ave for the Eastern Aves;


• Senate District 8 Senator Jen Plumb, jplumb@le.utah.gov, covering the southern portion of the Aves and Federal Heights.

I hope you take the time to attend our February Community Council meeting on Wednesday, February 7th, to learn more about our state issues.

Below are some tips on how to get involved in the state legislative process:

1. **Follow Legislation**. Hundreds of bills are filed every year. Go to Bills and Resolutions for the 2024 General Session (https://le.utah.gov/DynaBill/BillList) to access all bills. You can read the bill language, who the sponsors are, and stay informed about pending committee hearings. You can even subscribe to bills that are important to you to be notified of any wording or status changes as they go


through the legislative process.



3. Call and Email Your Legislators. If you can't attend a committee hearing, you can still make your voice heard by calling or emailing your legislature (emails listed above) and telling them which bills you support or oppose.

Tip: Putting the word "Constituent" in the email subject line makes them more likely to open, read, and respond.

4. **Be Ready to Act**. The legislative session runs very quickly, and bills are often introduced and brought to a vote in just a few days - sometimes in a single day. Keep on your toes and be ready to act!

### Salt Lake Avenues Community Choir Thrills Standing-Room-Only Audience

The 100 member all-volunteer and non-denominational Salt Lake Avenues Community Choir (SLACC) presented its eighth Annual Holiday Concert in Libby Gardner Concert Hall at



the University of Utah on the evening of December 18, 2023 to an enthusiastically engaged standing-room-only audience.

The choir was honored to be introcuded by Governor Michael Leavitt, President of the Tabernacle Choir. The program included 11 choral selections across a broad spectrum of sacred and secular seasonal music, one of which included a hauntingly lovely young soprano solo and another with a graceful ASL interpretation.

In addition to excellent piano accompaniment, several of these pieces were also accompanied by professional musicians playing various combinations of violin, harp, percussion, bagpipes, and organ.

professional musicians performing four instrumental and ensemble selections including an impressive piano solo, several toe-tapping Irish folk songs (fiddle, mandolin, bass, and percussion), a pensively beautiful country ballad (deep baritone vocal with mandolin,




violin, bass, and percussion), and a rousing, rumbling organ solo.

#### Illuminating the Red-tailed Hawk By Hilary Jacobs

The next time you are out for a walk, make a point of looking

up—into the sky, on treetops, utility poles, or on fenceposts - and there's a good chance you'll see a Red-tailed Hawk. Red-tails are the second largest Buteo hawk in North America, occupying open habitats.

Noted for broad rounded wings that span nearly four and a half feet, these hawks appear in dark, rufous, and light

morphs (forms). Most common, the light morphs have ruddy brown backs and heads, and a short, wide red tail.

When seen from underneath these hawks are pale with a dark band across the belly, white throat, dark shoulder bars, and black tipped feathers. When soaring, you'll see the sun glow red through their tails.

Whether flying or perched Red-tails scan the ground for prey. They eat mostly small mammals but also birds, snakes and carrion. Like Great-horned Owls and Magpies, Red-tails build big stick nests—up to 6 feet tall and 3 feet across—in tree tops or on high ledges, affording them safety and good views. As you walk look for nests hidden high in the tree tops.

Listen for the Red-tailed Hawk's classic screech. You'll probably recognize the sound because Hollywood plays a Red-tailed Hawk call whenever there's an eagle on screen. If you hear the call, take a look, as you may be privy to a special event. Once, the call alerted me to an airshow of tumbling and turning and screeching as one Red-tail tried to steal prey from another's talons. Ultimately the prey was dropped, the thief flew away and the hunter resumed searching for dinner.

Note that Scrub-Jays and Steller's Jays, both commonly seen in the Foothills, can perfectly mimic the Red-tail call. So, when you hear a Red-tail, look closely... you may have been fooled!

While generally we see less wildlife in the Foothills during the quiet winter months you will actually see more Red-tailed Hawks. With the arrival of winter cold, birds from the far north join those living further south. Hence this is a good time for you to become familiar with this quintessential hawk.

#### **Environmental Tips**

"Clean Coal" - Reality or Myth?

Burning coal contributes more CO2 to our Greenhouse Gasses than almost any other energy source (excluding wood and the burning of dung).

As coal oxidizes, one pound of coal produces 2.5 pounds of CO2. A coal power plant uses 25% of the energy it produces to capture its CO2. Coal power plants release Sulfur-Dioxide, Nitrogen-Oxide, Mercury and other metals, and a tremendous amount of heat, all of which leads to unhealthy air and contributes to Climate Change and a harmful costs to life.

The path to meeting our Paris Climate Accord commitment lies primarily with our reduction of the usage of "Clean Coal." The 1.9% reduction in pollution by the US in 2023 was attributed primarily to the reduced use of coal.

Even with the cold and snow the City Creek Canyon Water Treatment Plant is under construction. Mechanical, electrical, and structural modifications to the filter building are underway. Removal of the electrical utilities and flocculation basin are continuing. Mondays through Fridays we ask that you please stay safe while using the canyon trails, do not cross onto the road as construction equipment will continue to be transported throughout the canyon. During weekends and holidays, do not pass site #16, there might not be vehicles moving, but it is an active construction zone with hazards.
