Chair's Message for October

Avenues Power

A few years ago, I went to a photography store on 200 East. I was surprised to see 4 or 5 of the staff standing by the window very interested in what was happening outside. So, I looked too. Turns out they were watching a police "sting." The store was between 200 and 300 South with a mid-block pedestrian crosswalk right in front. The police were check-



ing to see if cars would stop for the pedestrians walking in the crosswalk. One policeman in plain clothes would walk across the street while another watched with a radio to contact a couple policemen a block away who would stop the offenders. The staff found it very entertaining watching the policeman dodge the cars and seeing those cars pulled over.

Utah law states motorists must yield to pedestrians crossing roadways within a crosswalk if the pedestrian is "on the half of the roadway upon which the vehicle is traveling" or "when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the roadway as to be in danger."

I remembered this incident when Ann, an Avenues neighbor emailed me about her concerns for street safety. I also remembered a research project I read about in the book *The Power Paradox: How We Gain and Lose Influence* written by Dacher Keltner, a psychologist at University of California at Berkeley. He has some very interesting theories on power, how to get it and what it does to a person when he has power.

He talked about gaining power in two ways – (1) Coercion Power -- using force or threats and (2) Reputational Power -- using ideas, friendship, and respect. Reputational or Soft Power is actually more powerful. However, their studies have shown that once a person gets power, he/she tends to be less empathetic, losing the ability to react to people's emotions and becoming less interested in other people. Power can make us more "self-focused". "This can happen to us all. It is just what the mind does when we feel powerful. Power" he says, "is part of every moment of our social lives. We've got to be aware of it. It can lead us to do foolish things, and we should try to do the things that make it a force for good."

One of their experiments he called the "crosswalk experiment." Dr. Keltner came up with the idea when he was biking to work and was almost hit by a black Mercedes. "I thought it'd be really interesting to test these ideas about the impulsive actions that power produces by looking at how people drive."

They put an undergraduate at a pedestrian crossing zone right next to the Berkeley campus. Another student was coding – making note of the make of the car and whether the car stopped for the pedestrian or blazed right through. They replicated this experiment many times in many different states. Their findings: 0% of drivers in cheap cars "blazed" through while 46.2% of drivers in expensive cars did not stop for pedestrians who had the right of way.

After he published the results of this experiment, Dr. Keltner said he's had emails from all over. One of his favorites was from

a Prius driver who said that he was not surprised by Mercedes drivers, but Prius drivers abide by the law. "So we checked and the Prius drivers were actually the worst."

We were with friends one time sharing our pet peeves about drivers and pedestrians. A psychologist in the group commented that when pedestrians, particularly if poorly dressed, crossed late, they were probably experiencing the only time in their lives when they could exert power over someone else. I don't get frustrated by them anymore.

Now, let me get back to Ann's concerns about street safety. Each of us wields power whether we walk, ride or drive. Think about it. Are you going to be "self-focused" or "empathetic" as you move through the Avenues? How will you use your power?

Survey on the 11th Avenue Park looped path

Public Lands provided a project summary for proposed improvements to 11th Avenue Park in the May 2019 issue of the Avenues Newsletter. We received several comments requesting that we make the looped path less than 6-feet wide in order to preserve a soft surface walking shoulder. Given this feedback, Parks posted signs in the park for a month to solicit park user preferences.

We asked park users what kind of path they would prefer: A) 6-foot concrete path (snow removed on the concrete path) or B) 4-Foot Concrete path with a 2-foot natural dirt shoulder (snow will be removed on the concrete path. The natural dirt surface shoulder can be used as a soft walking surface but may become muddy during inclement weather.) We received 48 responses with more than half of the respondents requesting a 4-foot concrete path with a 2-foot shoulder. Of the 48 respondents, 88% visit the park at least weekly and 70% people thought it was at least somewhat important to have a soft surface path. Public Lands revised our plans to include the community preferred option of a 4-foot concrete path.

Design for the park improvements is now complete. The Salt Lake City will request competitive bids from contractors in October with construction ensuing over the winter.
